Debunking Flu Shot Myths

MYTH: Anyone who received the flu shot last year doesn't need one

Flu viruses adapt rapidly so the flu shot you received last year may not protect you from this year's flu strain. Additionally, your immune response to any vaccination declines over time, so you need a new vaccine every year to protect yourself during each flu season.

MYTH: The flu shot gives you the flu.

A recent study showed that 35% of CVS pharmacy patients actually believe that the flu shot causes the flu. However, the vaccine is made from an inactivated virus that cannot transmit the flu. Adults who get the flu shot might experience soreness, redness, or swelling at the injection site.

MYTH: If you hate shots, you can get the nasal spray vaccination instead.

In recent years, the intranasal spray vaccine was a very popular alternative to the intramuscular flu vaccination (the shot), especially in children. This vaccination contains a live but weakened flu virus that scientists thought would provide greater protection. In the current 2017 to 2018 season, this vaccine is no longer an option because clinical studies show that it has little to no protective benefit.

MYTH: The flu shot is too expensive.

For anyone who has health insurance most vaccines are covered. However, if you do not have health insurance and want to pay out-of-pocket, the cost of the flu vaccine ranges from \$25 to \$50. Drug store pharmacist and technicians are very good at working with you to make sure you receive vaccinations when it is necessary.

MYTH: Pregnant women should not be vaccinated.

The flu vaccination is recommended for any pregnant or breastfeeding women. It is safe during any trimester of pregnancy, all the way up until your due date. Being vaccinated helps to protect both the mother and child from getting the flu.


And a QUESTION: What flu shots are available this flu season?

Several vaccines are available this 2017-2018 influenza season. Talk to your pharmacist about the various types, and ask if you should receive the trivalent (which includes three kinds of inactivated flu viruses) or the quadrivalent (which includes four kinds of inactivated flu viruses).

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


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
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
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Lincoln in the Bardo





Bardo is a strangely fascinating story, built at the intersection of this world and the next, of death and new life, of atonement, punishment, and rebirth. Buried internally is an almost painful recreation of Lincoln's despair and his bottomless sadness over the death of his son Willie and over his realization that with the serious prosecution of the Civil War, he is himself sending a nation's sons, to death.

Readers may need clues to unlock the meanings Saunders has hidden in his unique format. One hint is that in Tibetan Buddhism, "bardo" is a state of existence between death and rebirth. Time in the bardo varies according to a person's conduct in life, age at time of death, and manner of death.

A second clue is that the voices of the dead intermix with historical bits from Lincoln's time (newspapers, memoirs, etc.). And yet a third point is that the dead do not realize they are dead, but think themselves only "sick." Nor do they realize that time has passed and that they are several presidents out of date.

There is mid-book a discussion of free will. The woman who killed Elmer excuses herself by saying she was "just made that way." She could not be other than she was made, much like Judas'

explanation, plaint in Jesus Christ Superstar. The baby killers excuse themselves the same way. Only when people understand and repent their deeds do they have a chance to move on and be reborn.

Saunders addresses slavery through different speakers, including a black man, Thomas Havens. Thomas initially emphasizes the goodness with which he and his family had been treated by their white masters. Slowly however he realizes that, as well as he has been treated, he has never been free. Ironically he is the one soul that merges with Lincoln. He vows that as painful as Lincoln's suffering is for him to share "I resolved nevertheless to stay."

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To avoid raccoon problems, make life uncomfortable for them:

Raccoons dislike bright lights, loud noises or strong odors:

·Place lights, play a radio, or place mothballs or towels soaked in ammonia where they seem to congregate. (Your neighbors are going to love this, aren't they?)

- •Take in pet food and water.
- ·Secure all trash can lids.
- Clear wood and brush piles.
- •Trim overhanging branches and remove wires or vines that raccoons could use as ladders to access attics.
- •Sprinkle commercial products containing coyote urine.

Aren't raccoons cute? Ha! Every year, wildlife control agencies receive more nuisance calls for problems with raccoons, one of the most intelligent of wild animals, than for any other animal. They get into everything.

IMPORTANT NOTE: The Animal Welfare League (AWL) of Arlington recently captured two rabid racoons, one in the 2000 block of Military Road in Cherrydale, and the second in the 2000 block of 6th Street S. in Penrose. If you or your pets may have had contact with any raccoon in that vicinity should call AWL at (703) 931-9241.

> If you have a concern about wildlife in your backyard, call the Wildlife Hotline at (703) 440-0800.

The word raccoon is Algonquin for "he scratches with his hands." Native to the Americas, raccoons can be found from southern Canada to northern Argentina. They prefer lower elevations, milder climates, and hardwood forests near water.

Raccoons have adapted well to urban sprawl. They use the storm drain system as a personal highway system, covet your uncovered garbage can, and raid your vegetable garden—but not until you're just about ready to pick those vegetables!

The average raccoon is two to three feet long, weighs 10 to 30 pounds, and can be expected to live 16 years. Raccoons are unusual among wildlife mammals, because their paws include a thumb. Their thumbs are not opposable, like human's are, but they still give raccoons tremendous dexterity. They climb easily, and can unlock doors. Raccoons are omnivorous. Have you heard that raccoons wash their food? What looks like washing is actually manipulating or "softening" whatever they pick up. They are fastidious, however, and establish a common latrine for their families.

Female raccoons have one three-to-five kit litter annually, usually in May or June. Males roam areas of 3 to 20 square miles, depending on availability of females and food sources. Females stay closer to home—a six square mile range is usual.

Unsecured trash cans, overfilled bird feeders and outdoor pet bowls are potential food sources for raccoons. They consider chimneys, porches, decks and attics perfect dens. Since raccoons are primarily nocturnal, the only evidence of their presence may be noises in the wall or their distinctive tracks (see below).
