% cup sugar

¼ cup shortening

1 egg

½ cup milk

2 cups flour

½ tsp. salt

2 tsp. baking powder

2 cups blueberries



Mix thoroughly sugar, shortening and egg. Stir in milk, add flour, baking powder and salt. Fold in berries, batter will be thick. Spread in a greased 9-inch square pan. Sprinkle with crumb topping.

Crumb Topping:

Mix ½ cup sugar, 1/3 cup flour, ½ teaspoon cinnamon and ¼ cup soft butter.

Bake at 375* for 40 to 45 minutes.



Food scraps drop-off is open!

This service, rolled out in August as a pilot program to address increasing interest from residents to manage food disposal through a more environmentally conscious process, is now available to all Arlington County residents. Food scraps that are collected will be processed at the Earth Products Recycling Yard using an in-vessel composter. The resulting compost product will be made available to the Department of Parks and Recreation for landscaping projects in public spaces and to amend topsoil in County projects.

Acceptable Materials

Please place loose items or those contained in paper bags in the green organics carts. No plastic bags.

The site accepts the following foods:

- Fruits
- Vegetables
- Food soiled paper (paper towels, napkins and paper plates)
- Coffee grounds, filters and tea bags
- Breads, grains and pasta
- Meat and seafood (including bones)
- Plate scrapings

Food scraps will be collected in two green, organics carts located at the bottom of the scale house. The scale house is located at the top of the Trades Center hill to the right. Please see the scale operator after parking your vehicle for assistance with disposing of your food scraps.

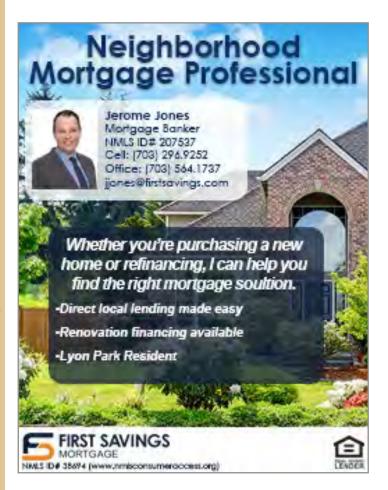



Delicious! Margaret Dean



Reichl was the restaurant critic for The Los Angeles Times, then The New York Times and, later, editor-in-chief of Gourmet Magazine, so she knows food and taste buds, like when ripe, glistening vanilla beans are "supple, plump and purple."

While Reichl has changed some key elements of Delicious!, this novel, especially the first half, seriously flirts with becoming autobiographical: losing her job at Delicious!, New York's premiere food magazine; family stresses; love of tantalizing food language all parallel her own life. They all evoke Reichl's earlier autobiographical accounts, starting with her first book, Tender at the Bone.

The language used to describe food is absolutely scrumptious, with "rustic ceramic cups of green tea" blending with "the scent of soy sauce, dried shrimp and garlic" (76) or gingerbread cake enlivened by orange zest and fresh ginger and black pepper and cloves and cardamom. The text is just as light and laughable as it can be, if somewhat improbable.

Essentially the narrative describes Billie Breslin's efforts to establish herself in NY's culinary scene, identify and then locate the then 11-year old who had a secret World War II food correspondence with world famous chef, James Beard, repair the rift with her family, and find true love.

While some critics have labeled Reichl's first venture into fiction as contrived, sentimental, unrealistic, if amiable enough, I rather liked losing myself in a fictional world where love (all kinds of love: love of family, love of food, love of friends, love of a mystery, romantic love) is clearly going to triumph. While a long book Delicious! is a quick read, easily digestible. Share with tea time scones.

Dieter and Dog Danger Zone: Halloween through New Years

Human dieters approach the weeks between Halloween and New Year's Day with dread because there's an endless parade of candy bowls, appetizer platters, and holiday treats that undermine weight loss efforts. Many of these treats also tempt pets. Here's a fact that every pet owner needs to know:

50% of all animal poisonings occur between Halloween and New Year's Day.

Safety Call's Pet Poison Helpline (1-800-213-6680) provided this statistic to us based on the number of calls they received over the past few years. In the statistic is reliable—on average, they receive 1.3 million calls every year concerning animals that have ingested potential poisons. While some of these calls pertain to farm animals, the vast majority come from owners of cats and dogs.

Cats are notoriously finicky, but from time to time they consume things they shouldn't. Every cat owner should be aware of one substance that is toxic to cats: acetaminophen, or Tylenol. Cats that eat acetaminophen become ill, developing a problem called methhemoglobinemia, a blood disorder, and then liver failure extremely quickly (often within hours). Their poor little faces swell, and this is a serious medical emergency.

The Pet Poison Helpline says that lately, garbage disposal cleaner/deodorizer balls are on their radar. Cats love them, and have even been known to pull them out of the garbage disposal! When cats chew on these balls, they burst. The lemon scented types contain concentrated citrus oil (d-limonene) which is toxic to cats. Orange and lavender varieties can be less toxic, but natural cleaners like a tablespoon of baking soda followed by a cup of vinegar are smarter.

Dogs are a different story due to the fact that they are indiscriminate about what they eat; usually larger than cats; and metabolize things differently. The Pet Poison Helpline reports that the top three items about which they receive calls are chocolate, insect bait stations, and rodenticides (i.e. mouse and rat poison). When dogs eat chocolate, their symptoms will depend on dogs size and the amount of chocolate consumed. You can check online at

http://www.askavetquestion.com/chocolate_toxicity.php) to determine if they need to worry and dash to the vet.

Insect bait stations contain a sweet insect attractant. The scent attracts pets, too, and they may shred or swallow them ito get to the sweet part. The concentration of insecticide in most household ant or roach traps is very small and likely to cause only mild stomach irritation in pets. The plastic housing is more dangerous than the bait inside. If dogs shred or swallow the bait trap whole, sharp plastic can rip or obstruct the gut. The best bet is to use these traps only in areas where dogs cannot reach.



Dogs also tend to eat fertilizer, xylitol containing products, ibuprofen, acetaminophen, silica gel packs, amphetamines (i.e. medicine for attention deficit disorder), and household cleaners. Among these the most dangerous are xylitol containing products, ibuprofen, and acetaminophen. Xylitol is a sugar substitute found in foods, chewing gum, breath mints, and all kinds of medicines. It's extremely toxic to dogs, causing profound low blood sugar within 10 to 30 minutes and eventually cause liver failure.

Drugs that contain xylitol include Neurontin, Abilify, Allegra, Mobic, RioMet, clonazepam and many others. Icebreakers Ice Cubes gum, Nicorette gum, Beano, Mentos, resveratrol tablets, and energy drinks also contain xylitol. It's also a common additive for deodorants, makeup removers, shaving cream, and baby wipes.

In dogs that consume acetaminophen, toxicity is slower than in cats and liver failure generally comes before methemoglobinemia. Dog owners should store any painkillers carefully, as dogs cannot take many of the human painkillers including ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin), naproxen (Aleve, Naprosyn), or similar drugs. They develop ulcers from these drugs very quickly.

Finally, rodenticides often contain blood thinners. Dogs and cats may eat rodenicides (or mice or rats that have eaten the poison and died), and may develop a bleeding. If you have a rodent problem, it's best to trap rather than poison if you have pets.

Unlike the Human Poison Control Hotline, the Pet Poison Helpline is not free. When you call, you need to have your credit card available so that they can charge \$59. Please note that this fee covers not only the first call, but any additional calls from you or your veterinarian for the problem.
