

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

#### The Ascent of Money

In Ferguson's view finance, especially the evolution of debt and credit, is the foundation of human progress. Finance is as important as any technological innovation in the rise of civilization. Ferguson's account of the history of money will strengthen the reader's understanding of the rise of specific economic conditions, such as income inequity, securitization, or the conversion from a gold standard not just to paper but to electronic dots on a screen.

Conceptually moving from something tangible to secure a loan to a mental concept requires a great leap of faith in the institutions that provide, monitor and supervise these systems. Greed and the lack of accountability by extensive deregulation can easily lead to the demise of financial institutions and the destruction of assets, whether bonds, stocks or other financial instruments. Ferguson makes this clear in his account of the Enron collapse; it affected institutions and hundreds of individuals.

In looking at the concept of risk management, Ferguson shows one long struggle between our desires to be financially secure and the hard reality that there is no such thing...only coping with multiple unforeseeable futures. To make insurance more than just a bet requires the use of statistically well grounded probability. Even so probability can only tell us the chance an airplane will crash into our house but not the certainty of that event. In his Afterword, Ferguson addresses financial markets' inherent instability as due to human behavior.

Ferguson examines insurance, welfare, futures contracts, houses and mortgages, including subprime mortgages, hedge funds, etc. Ferguson recounts the creating of the international financial institutions, like the World Bank, or the International Monetary Fund. He looks briefly at the U.S. economic leadership and the possible shift in the global balance of financial/economic power. He questions whether a catastrophic collapse could happen again. Given Ferguson wrote this in 2007, he may be prescient in wondering if something could trigger a breakdown in globalization and interdependence of the world economy. He speculates that indeed major wars can and do arise when economic ties are strong. Ferguson has a light style that makes him easy to read and to understand.



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#### A Dirty Job, but Someone Has to Do It



Dear neighbors:

Many of you visit the park often, and enjoy its open green space and play areas. We welcome and encourage Lyon Park residents, their guests, and in fact *anyone* to come and enjoy. We have had a longstanding problem with the trash cans in the park, however.

Often the trash cans become full, and folks just keep cramming trash into them. Once they overflow, the trash blows around and rodents (please don't make me get more specific!) consider it an open invitation to "picnic" after dark. This gets ugly quickly. Could you kindly consider these suggestions?


- THINK: COMPACT. Smash trash before putting it in the park trash cans. Often, the cans fill with Styrofoam containers or coffee cups that are mostly air. Please crush your trash!
- THINK: RECYCLE. Walk your recycling to the enclosed trash pad on the Community Center's south end, and place it in the recycling bins.
- THINK: I CAN HELP! If the can is full, please consider taking
  the swinging-door lid off, taking the trash out (it is in a 33
  gallon bag), and placing it in the Eagle Cart in the enclosed
  trash area. We'll leave an extra bag in the bottom of the can
  so you can replace it.
- THINK: THIS WILL STINK. Please take your most aromaproducing garbage home with you if possible; specifically, we mean dirty disposable diapers.
- THINK: SHARE INFORMATION. If you see others who need a little education, please gently steer them to the enclosed trash area, and the larger receptacles.
- THINK: NIP THIS IN THE BUD! E-mail me at jywickrph@aol.com if you see a trash problem.

Additionally, because we often have paying renters who expect to use areas of the park, groups of 10 or more who plan to have an event in the park should make arrangements with our rental agent, Cindy Stroup at rent@lyonpark.info before doing so. In the warmer months, the park is often rented.

P.S. The park closes at dusk, and we inform renters of this when they sign a contract. Renters are not allowed outside on the patio after dark either. We tell them clearly that they must move all activity inside at dusk, and we review our noise guidelines.

#### **Pershing Drive Complete Streets Project Update**

Over the last two years, Arlington County conducted an extensive process involving the community to plan transportation improvements along the Pershing Drive corridor between North Barton and North Piedmont Streets. This effort primarily considered improvements at several intersections along the corridor. The concepts were finalized last spring and the priority intersections (those that will be addressed first with the available project funding) were selected.

Design development is now underway for priority/Phase I intersection improvements on Pershing Drive at North Fillmore Street, North Garfield Street, North Highland Street, North Oakland Street and North Oxford Street. The plans are about half way through design development. Staff has started the process of obtaining necessary easements to install the improvements. The County anticipates the project will advertise for construction in late 2019.

The Pershing Drive Complete Streets (PDCS) planning process also generated two concepts for improving the section of N. Pershing Drive between Washington Boulevard and North Barton Street. This segment of Pershing is scheduled for a road surfacing (microseal) treatment this summer. While funding is not available to construct any improvements permanently on this section of N. Pershing Drive, the pending micro-seal treatment offers an opportunity to implement some of the improvements early as a "pilot" installation. Therefore, the County would like to select the preferred concept to implement with the micro-seal and pavement markings this summer.

In accordance with the recently adopted Arlington County Public Engagement Guide, staff will conduct additional outreach with residents regarding the two concepts. An open house will be held on Tuesday, May 22, 2018 at the Lyon Park Community Center from 4:30 – 7:00 PM. Residents are invited to stop by to view illustrations and record their comments about the options.

Materials shared at the open house will be posted on the project website (https://projects.arlingtonva.us/projects/pershing-drive-complete-street-improvements/), and an online commenting tool will be available for two weeks following the open house. Staff will consider the additional public feedback from the open house to determine which concept will be implemented during this summer's pavement marking season.
