S'more Pudgy Pie

2 slices cinnamon bread
2 tablespoons Nutella
1/2 graham cracker, crushed
1 tablespoon miniature marshmallows

Place one slice of bread in a greased sandwich iron. Spread with Nutella; sprinkle with cracker crumbs and marshmallows. Top with remaining bread slice. Close iron.

Cook over a hot campfire for 1 to 1 ½ minutes or until golden brown, turning occasionally. (Or grill on the stove!)

S'mores Monkey Bread Muffins

15 frozen bread dough dinner rolls, thawed but still cold
1-1/3 cups graham cracker crumbs
1/2 cup sugar
6 tablespoons butter, cubed
1 cup miniature semisweet chocolate chips, divided
3/4 cup miniature marshmallows

ICING

1 cup confectioners' sugar
1/2 teaspoon butter, softened
1 to 2 tablespoons 2% milk

Preheat oven to 375°. Line 12 muffin cups with foil liners. Cut each dinner roll into four pieces. In a shallow bowl, mix cracker crumbs and sugar. In a large microwave-safe bowl, microwave butter until melted. Dip three pieces of dough in butter, then roll in crumb mixture to coat; place in a prepared muffin cup. Repeat until all muffin cups are filled. Sprinkle tops with 3/4 cup chocolate chips and marshmallows. Toss remaining dough pieces with remaining butter, rewarming butter if necessary. Place two additional dough pieces into each cup; sprinkle with remaining chocolate chips.

Bake until golden brown, 15-20 minutes. Cool 5 minutes before removing from pan to a wire rack. Mix icing ingredients; spoon over tops. Serve warm.

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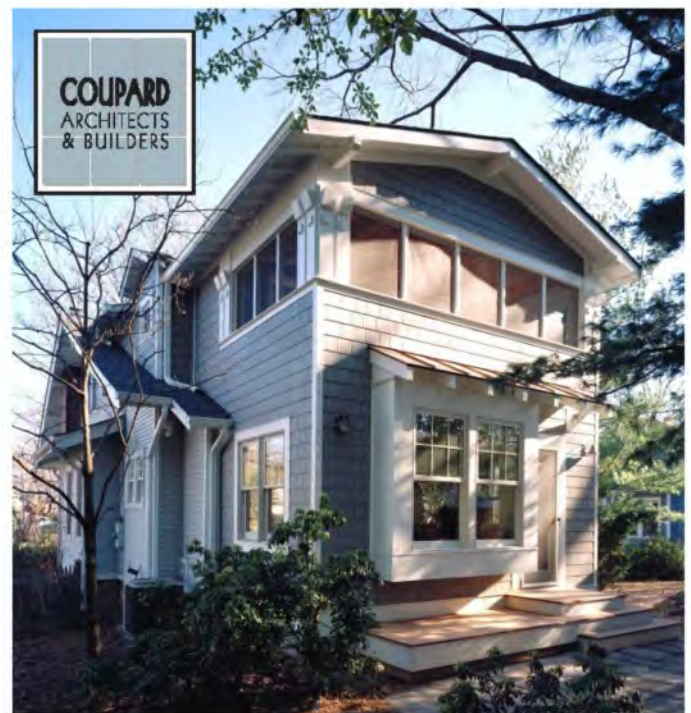
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LeKon: New Restaurant, Exciting Flavors

LeKon is a new restaurant in the Clarendon area (3227 Washington Blvd), that replaces Park Place, a restaurant that closed before anyone really got to see it. Don't let that happen to LeKon! We have visited LeKon a number of times and have found it to be a wonderful spot to eat lunch, dinner or sneak in to enjoy an incredibly generous happy hour. LeKon is a Mexican-Asian fusion experience. While that might sound strange, the combination works well. We have yet to be disappointed.

You can start your meal with a chips and salsa. LeKon offers five different salsas: a traditional pico de gallo, which is wonderful, and then some more interesting and unique salsas: white habanero, tomatillo avocado and mango chipotle which we would encourage you to try. The price is right for the chips and salsa offering, ranging from only \$3 for one salsa to \$9 for five salsas. To say that the chips portions are healthy is an understatement!



We cannot claim to have tried everything on the menu, but everything we have tried has been very tasty and unique. For instance, the adobo prawns served with fennel and dill are excellent, as is the tuna tostada served with daikon, olive oil, and avocado. A charred cauliflower burrito on the lunch menu was delicious, as was the quinoa and brussels salad. One can also make a lovely lunch or dinner out of the side dishes; broiled cauliflower, poblano mac and cheese, and charred corn esquites are among the offerings we have tried and enjoyed. Also, we should mention that we are vegetarian/pescetarian, so we obviously steered towards non-meat dishes. If you are a carnivore there are a number of attractive menu options: hand cut filet, skirt steak, New York steak, and chicken. And you can add chicken, steak or shrimp to any of the salads. Just wander on to the LeKon web site to see the full menus.

In addition, the happy hour runs from 3 to 8 PM, during which you can get some pretty nice wines, mixed drinks, and margaritas at reduced prices (i.e. for instance, a glass of house wine runs \$5).

We believe LeKon is a great addition to the neighborhood. The service has been consistently impressive and the folks working there are accessible and just plain nice. Give it a try, we think you'll be glad you did.

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What's the Status of Your New Year's Resolution?

It's mid-January and it's likely that exercise classes throughout the region are packed, produce aisles empty, and bank accounts overflowing, but for how long? Statistics vary, but according to several sources, New Year's Resolutions last the following lengths:

- One-third of resolutions fail by the end of January
- 80% of New Year's Resolutions don't make it past mid-February
- By the end of December, folks have kept fewer than 10% of original New Year's Resolutions

Re-write, refresh, and/or re-plan your resolutions! To maximize your possibility of success, make your resolutions Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-Bound (SMART).

- **Specific.** Rather than a broad goal ("I'll eat more vegetables") make it specific ("I will eat two additional servings of vegetables each day and one serving will be carrots at breakfast.") Or something like that...
- **Measurable.** When a goal is measurable, you'll know when you've achieved it or when you need to revisit it. To measure your progress, take photos and keep notes in a journal or website. Reward yourself for meeting smaller goals.
- **Achievable.** If your goal is too much of a stretch—"30 pull-ups after one month at the gym!"—it can leave you frustrated and disaffected. Think about future you, and make the goal doable in the time frame you've got.
- **Relevant.** Does this goal matter to you? Or, are you setting it because you think you should?
- **Time-bound.** When is your goal going to end? Give yourself enough time, and think about how you'll sustain this resolution for the long term.

As you move forward with your SMART resolutions remember: change is hard! When you slip up—you will—practice self-forgiveness. Remember, tomorrow is another day and Memorial Day (May 27, 2019) is just as good a day to re-start resolutions as January 1.

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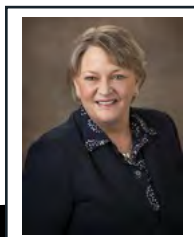
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A Little Dirt Never Hurt

As autumn progressed and winter loomed, I took comfort in knowing my indoor plants would provide a little dose of green until spring. Then I looked at them. Most were browning, spindly, ugly, and looking peaked. Ever the fan of rescue operations—all my pets come from rescue and I generally check craigslist before buying most things—this seemed almost overwhelming. I took myself out to my favorite lunch joint. It's filled with lush greenery, and I asked the owner his secret. He asked why I was asking, and I explained the houseplant dilemma. He said, "Throw them away."

What? I've had these plants for years, years I tell you! He said, "Right. Toss them." He said that he hires a company to rotate his plants every 60 days. They take old plants back to a greenhouse and replace them with a healthier version of the same plant. At home, I took stock. Yes, in retrospect, the previous owners probably left that five foot tall pony palm nine years ago because they were too lazy to take it to the compost heap. It could go. The peace lily that has been resurrected four times? Enough! I maneuvered the wheel barrow to the living room window and tossed everything out.



The Green Thumbed Restaurateur said to consider several factors (see sidebar). In addition, he advised, "Grow what you know," meaning if you've had success with a plant in the past, you'll probably grow it successfully again. For me, that brought back recollections of my college room bursting with plant life. I started my search looking for Swedish ivy

(*Plectranthus australis*), purple passion (*Gynura aurantiaca*), and wandering jew (*Tradescantia pallid*)—plants that had been almost uncontrollable in my dorm room. With succulents and cactus all the rage right now, these plants were nonexistent on the local economy. The solution: ebay! I ordered economical cuttings, and planted them in pots.

Daytime winter temperatures of 65° to 75° and night temperatures of 60° to 65° are fine for most plants. Grouping plants preserves moisture and humidity, as does placing smaller pots on the soil of larger plants.

If you travel in winter, consider another college trick. Water all plants a few days before you leave, and letting them drain well. Place each plant in a plastic bag, and close the bag tightly. Set them anywhere where there is light. When you return, open the bags and you'll feel the humidity rush out. The plants will be happy and healthy. Each bag acts creates a terrarium environment.

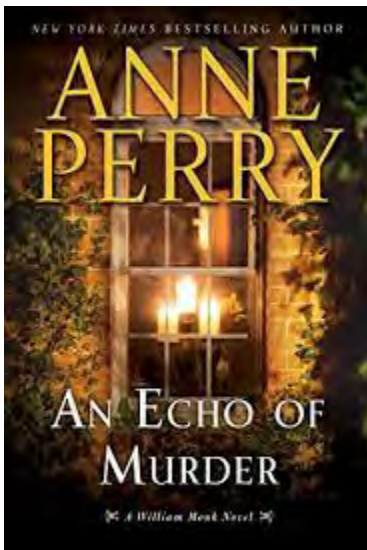
SIDEBAR: Seven Secrets for Superb Houseplants

1. **Let in the light.** All houseplants need at least some light from outdoors. Some need less than others. In winter, the strongest light will be in south- and west-facing windows. Placing fluorescent or traditional grow lights four to 18 inches away from plants is also an option. This boils down to researching plants that will thrive in the light you have, not buying plants and putting them on any handy sill.
2. **Choose containers carefully.** Avoid containers that lack drainage. Look up the pros and cons of clay and plastic pots.
3. **Select soil circumspectly.** Potted plants absorb most food through nutrients in the soil. Soil also provides proper aeration and moisture-holding capability. Plan to re-pot annually as the soils wears out.
4. **Water warily.** Overwatering is as troublesome as underwatering. Only water when the top two inches of soil are dry. Many experts recommend bottom watering. Fill a container large enough to hold the planter halfway with distilled or filtered water. Place the planter in the container for 10 to 20 minutes (until the soil feels damp near the surface). Once a month, water from the top.
5. **Fertilize.** Watering leaches nutrients, so find a good fertilizer and follow the directions. A one-size-fits-all fertilizer for houseplants doesn't exist.
6. **Hike humidity.** Many houseplants like 40% to 50% humidity, but a typical home may have 5% to 10% relative humidity in winter. If you're thinking "misting," think again. Misting hikes humidity temporarily. Instead, increase ambient humidity overall by placing pots on top of pebbled trays full of water or using a humidifier.
7. **Clean, clip, check.** Dust on plants will block light and harbor insects. Wipe large leaves with a damp towel, or give them a gentle shower. Remove dry or dead leaves (but don't prune in winter), and treat insects with insecticidal soap promptly.



An Echo of Murder

The setting for *An Echo of Murder* cannot be an accident. Anne Perry plunks her detective, Thames River Police Commander William Monk, into the midst of an immigrant squabble 19th century style. Faced with rebellious Hungarians fleeing death or imprisonment in their homeland, Brits of high and low class fear the loss of jobs and economic security. They treat the immigrants with disdain and dislike. Monk believes “fear need not have a good reason,” and death, vicious, horrible death, has sometimes been the result. The background description demonstrates the difficulties people face adjusting to a new place, to different customs or even to changing conditions at home.

Perry also tackles PTSD, post Crimea style. Unfortunately one of the prime murder suspects in the death of a Hungarian is a British doctor who worked with Mrs. Monk at the front. He is also a good friend of Monk's. Dr. Fitzherbert has blackouts, hallucinations and memory loss so severe he cannot be confident in his own innocence. Fitzherbert's being left for dead in a pile of dead bodies personalizes that trauma.

Stylistically Perry in her two dozen Monk murders relies on paragraphs of questions to show thinking and to advance the plot. A little of this goes a long way: Was it something to do with them? Or with the murderer? Did the victims even know why they had been singled out? If they

hadn't, why not? And if they had, why had they done nothing to avoid their own deaths?

One technical drawback is the *deus ex machina* finale, where Perry leads her readers down the evidence trail in the best Christie tradition only to wrap up the murder in two pages. Confession, evidence of guilt, punishment, here are all the details neat and tidy, if somewhat unsatisfactorily.

Wondering what to do with that Christmas tree after the holidays?

During the first two full weeks of each January, Arlington County collects Christmas trees curbside for residential homes with trash and recycling service. Remove all decorations (lights, ornaments, stands), and place the tree on the curb no later than 6 AM.

The Department of Environmental Services will transform trees into wood mulch for gardens. After January 19, please prepare the tree for yard waste collection on your regular trash collection day.
