Route 50 (Arlington Boulevard) Study

The Virginia Department of Transportation is conducting a study of the 7/10 mile section of Route 50 between Fillmore Street and Glebe Road. They held a public meeting on November 14. The materials from this meeting are available online at www.virginiadot.org/route50arlingtonstudy.

Some interesting statistics presented at the meeting include the following:

- An average of 62,000 vehicles/day travel this section
- The east-bound peak is at 7 AM and is just below 3,500/hour
- The west-bound peak is at 5:30 PM and is about 3,250/hour
- Between 2014 and 2018 there were 247 crashes reported
- The intersections with the highest number of crashes are
 - o #1 Irving Street (>60)
 - #2 Fillmore Street (40)
 - #3 Highland Street (>30)

Unfortunately, the period for taking an online survey and provide comments ended on November 25th. In early 2020 VADOT will hold another public meeting to discuss alternatives developed as a result of public input.

Annual not-just-a-Craft Fair: Ups, Downs, and All Around FUN!

Each year, we look forward to the annual not-just-a-CRAFT FAIR with curiosity and hope. This year, our expectations were met and exceeded. The day began on a busy note as folks stopped in to pick up the 110+ pounds of *Regianno Parmesan* that Gary Putnam cut expertly, and Kit Putnam wrapped. Others came to find the best selection of hand-crafted goods. And the bake sale—several tables mounded with cookies, cupcakes, sweet breads, and regular loaves—was busy from opening to closing. Thank you for coming out and supporting this unique event. It features artisan crafters whose goods are juried (submitted for approval beforehand to ensure quality). Once approved, our vendors can return. This year, we filled several table vacancies and featured some new and highly talented individuals.

We featured four youth vendors at this event. We'd offered one table for an aspiring artist or crafter, and received four applications from the neighborhood from youths of varying ages and skill. Unable to chose one, we anchored the end of the hall with their four card tables. Little did we know that these crafters would teach the old dogs a few new tricks. Hats off to Maya Sherlick, who augmented her high quality pottery with a video display on an iPad and her own business cards. Kudos to Emma Miller, beekeeper, who offered the local-ist honey we'll ever see and amazing candles. Henry Sahm's "Fluffies"—remarkably detailed and bright sculptures—were so cute it hurt, and the King Siblings sold paracord bracelets and would make them to order at the table!

Go, Went, Gone

Margaret Dean



Ms Erpenbeck has undertaken the noble cause of explaining the plight of refugees to Germans and, more widely, to all first worlders. She makes refugees acceptable through their slowly growing interaction with her lead character, Richard, as Richard discovers the refugees' traumas, their disorientation, and the catch 22 of German refugee laws. That catch essentially makes it impossible for refugees to work and to establish roots. She also draws the comparison between today's refugees and the disorientation of many East Germans who woke one day to find their country had disappeared. Like the refugees, everything they knew had changed. East Germany had become a new political, unrecognizable entity called Germany.

The reader slowly discovers Richard. His wife died, perhaps from an alcoholism used to drown her sorrow over never having children. While still in school, she had had an abortion at Richard's insistence that they were too young to start a family. Now, with early, forced retirement, Richard has time to see the refugees, get to know them and create a substitute family. He understands their desire to work and is instrumental in getting temporary work for a few. He convinces some of his friends to house and help refugees awaiting deportation to Italy. Consequently the book ends on a happier note than appears to be the actual case in Germany.

Stylistically the language is heavy, the tone didactic and the imagery dense, especially the repeated reference to the dead man at the bottom of the lake. The title, Go Went Gone, combines reference to the hopeless, continuously interrupted

effort of the refugees to learn German and the wish of the German state to get rid of the refugees. The book, however, has done well both in Europe and in the U.S. The translation has been widely praised.

For ten years, our community raised money to renovate the community house. The 2009 message focused on raising money to start construction. In 2014, it shifted to raising funds to pay down the construction loan. We asked. You answered. In fact, you answered generously. In June 2019, we paid the balance of our loan (not months, but YEARS early) and took the loan guarantors off the hook.

Fundraising, in theory, is easy. An organization asks for money, and people give or don't give. In practice, fundraising is not exactly difficult, but requires strategic planning, a good understanding of who makes charitable donations and why, and ample creativity. You may recall the ALS Foundation's Ice Bucket Challenge of 2014—a stunning advertising campaign that went viral and raised \$220 million worldwide. Every fundraiser dreams of such a campaign—a movement that starts itself and spreads spontaneously.

For the last several years, Annemarie Selvitelli and I have run a listserv-based incentives program based ever-so-loosely on NPR's fundraising campaigns (NPR never seems to offer ugly blue rocking chairs or Susan's chicken pot pie). Neighbors offered incentives, creating a humorous assortment of baskets, white elephants, services, homemade goods, and matching funds. It was a roaring success, and we thank all who contributed.

This year, with the loan retired, our efforts need not be so intense. Although the renovation is now paid for, and rental income takes care of daily expenses, our park and community center still need our ongoing support. This includes paying for big but expected expenses like trimming the trees, and preparing for unexpected or larger future expenses. As we transition our fundraising efforts, we are more interested in broadening our base of support than asking for larger gifts of support. The more members of our community that invest in our community center, the more it becomes the center of our community. Please start or renew your commitment, and encourage a few neighbors to do it with you. See below for some ideas.

History Shapes Lives for Decades Christa Abbott

The year 1919 is important to me for two reasons: our neighborhood was founded and my grandma was born. She was born in Minnesota, where her family of Scottish immigrants had worked in the logging camps of the Northwoods. When she was young, her father, who had an 8th grade education, heard that there was work in D.C. Her family moved east to join extended family in Arlington Ridge, where she would spend the remainder of her childhood. Eventually, she would graduate from high school, join the war effort in D.C., and marry my grandfather, who was a naval engineer. When the war ended, they moved to Connecticut and bought a house in a developing suburb of New York City.

As I worked on planning the racial covenants event, I felt connection to my grandma. In history books, I saw pictures of her elementary school; I scanned old photos from the YWCA lodge on Vacation Lane looking for grandma's face. I also came to realize how my own life is shaped by the fact that grandma was a white, Christian child in 1920/1930s Arlington County. She attended segregated schools that helped her become a secretary in the War Department, a position unavailable to African-Americans. When they bought a house in Connecticut, it was most likely with an FHA loan, which were denied to African-American families. The town in which they bought a home went on to experience astronomical home value appreciation, but became infamous for anti-Semitic practices.

That home has provided financial stability for three generations and counting. My father attended a prestigious college. When I went to college, it was possible in part because my parents were not supporting his parents and knew they wouldn't have to; the family home would be sold to pay for assisted living, which it eventually was. Grandma passed away at the age of 98 and some money from that house remained. While we can never know what turns and twists our lives may have taken, I can say that the particular doors that my grandma walked through to provide financial ballast for our entire family would have been shut if she had not been white and Christian. I came to appreciate that my ability to buy a home and raise a family in Lyon Park today is not unrelated to grandma's experiences 100 years ago.

Expunging Restrictive Covenants Not Possible, Yet Toby McIntosh

The question of whether it is possible to get rid of restrictive covenants in Lyon Park deeds was raised at the recent meeting of the Lyon Park Community Association. Attended by 80 people, the vibrant session covered the history of these "Caucasian only" provisions and their lasting impact. Whether they can be removed came up, and the answer in brief is "not yet."

The covenants are invalid because of court decisions and illegal under Virginia law (VA Code 36-96.6), according to Paul Ferguson, Clerk of the Circuit Court. Under the state law, a new purchaser can "decline to accept" a deed including an exclusionary covenant. "However," Ferguson said, "I know of no Virginia law that allows for expungement or removal to those references."

That could change. Legislation on the subject is being drafted by Richmond Delegate Lamont Bagby. Several states have passed legislation allowing owners to add a statement to their deeds repudiating the covenants.

The Local Humble Hackberry

We are often so busy that we rarely get a chance to appreciate the interesting ecosystems right in our own backyards. Often, we don't see birds, insects, and other wildlife because they are too small, too shy, or operate on different schedules than we do. Other wild neighbors, like plants, go unnoticed and overlooked simply because their interesting stories are not obvious to the casual observer.

One such underappreciated local tree is *celtis occidentalis*, otherwise known as the hackberry tree. This robust hardwood tree reaches heights of more than 60 feet with a wide spread. Native to Virginia, its range extends throughout the midwestern United States and to southern Canada. It's related to the American elm and is identifiable by its bumpy, cork-like bark. The hackberry's unique, oval-shaped leaves are asymmetric and easily identified by the common wart-like "galls" that are almost universally present on any hackberry tree; these unsightly growths are the result of a particular insect (the hackberry gall midge) that latches to and continuously feeds on the leaf tissue. This causes the tree to encapsulate the insect by growing the trademark galls that, while unappealing, do not harm the tree.

By far the coolest thing about this tree is the fruit from which the tree derives its name. Every year the tree produces thousands of pea-sized berries with sweet, edible flesh that surrounds a hard seed that is notably high in fat and protein. Every October and November, as the fruit ripens, the tree becomes a smorgasbord as the local avian population finds this fruit delicious and swarms the tree. Humans also find this berry to be appealing, tasting like some fun mashup of a cherry and a raisin. The seed is often too tough to consume, but the entire berry can be mashed into a paste and eaten as a spread or even baked into a snack bar. Archaeologists have found caves right here in Virginia where humans were storing hackberries approximately 10,000 years ago, suggesting that the hackberry is one of the first foods that humans ever gathered and stored for later consumption!

Next time you're out walking around the area, keep an eye out for the hackberry tree and maybe you'll be able to snatch a tasty snack before all our furry and feathered friends pick the trees clean. There's something special about appreciating nature's little gifts that casually occupy our neighborhood.
